Speakers include:

Yasaman Ahanin:

Yasaman is the Training and Education Coordinator with the IHL Unit at the Canadian Red Cross. She provides logistics and training support for IHL dissemination through the Canadian Red Cross' targeted engagement in Canada with stakeholders ranging from academia and teachers, to armed and police forces. She was previously the Bilingual Program Coordinator for the YMCA of Greater Toronto and has experience as a Youth Outreach Worker, and an Instructor Therapist in a special-care facilities. Yasaman holds a Diploma in Behavioural Science Technician from George Brown College and Honours BA in International Development and History from Trent University. During her free time, she enjoys camping, hiking, and anything outdoors.

Andrea Barrow:

Andrea Barrow is with the Limestone District School Board in Kingston with qualifications in Health and Physical Education, Social Science, Business, Guidance and Special Education. She is currently the Equity and Inclusion Consultant in the secondary panel.

For the past 7 years Andrea has been a Teacher Champion with the Red Cross providing International Humanitarian Law PD for intermediate and secondary school teachers across the province including the creation of Exploring Humanitarian Law on Sexual Gender Based Violence including lessons on sexual offences against 2SLBGTQ+ individuals during armed conflict.

She has also been an Ambassador and presenter with Ophea promoting health and physical activity and for the past 5 years, Andrea has been part of the Ophea Safety and Injury Prevention Advisory Committee.

Andrea has worked on a few projects with OSSTF including School Mental Health, Addressing Anti-Black racism and "Common Threads" following the migration of asylum seekers in France and the UK.

Major Peter Briffett:

Major Peter Briffett has served with the Canadian Armed Forces for 23 years with the Canadian Army, Special Forces, and the Office of The Judge Advocate General. He has deployed on multiple international and domestic operations. Peter is a graduate of the Royal Military College of Canada and Queen's University Faculty of Law. In his current role, at the Canadian Forces Military Law Centre, Peter teaches IHL to members of the Canadian Armed Fores and allied forces at home and abroad.

Rachel Collishaw:

Rachel Collishaw is the president of the Social Studies Educators Network of Canada (SSENC). She has over twenty years of experience as a secondary history teacher and instructional coach in Ottawa, Ontario. She is recognized as a leader in developing professional learning and classroom resources that use historical thinking concepts to support inquiry learning. She is a recipient of the 2013 Governor General's History Award for Excellence in Teaching. In her day job, she now designs civic education resources and professional learning for educators at Elections Canada.

Tracy Crowe:

Tracy Crowe is the Program Specialist of Teacher Education at the University of Ottawa and is committed to honouring the calls to action from the TRC within teacher education. Originally an educator from the Ottawa Catholic School Board, Tracy has spent most of her 40 year teaching career in inclusive education working in a variety of special education settings including the OCSB Student Services Department. In the past twenty years with the Teacher Education Program, Tracy has taught curriculum and inclusive education courses in all three divisions as well as being a professional inquiry facilitator and practicum supervisor. She coordinates the Professional Inquiry in Practice courses, is a founding member and coordinates several projects with the "Developing a Global Perspective for Educators" Initiative, and coordinates professional learning opportunities for the Teacher Education program. Over her teaching career Tracy has had a continuing relationship with the University of Ottawa as an alumnus, an Associate Teacher, an instructor in the Professional Development program, as a Seconded Professor, and as the Program Specialist of Teacher Education. Her academic areas of interest include indigenous education, inclusive education, human rights, mentoring, and teacher education specifically in the development of attitudes, knowledge and skills for inclusive classrooms.

During the past 40 years Tracy has worked in a variety of special education settings and roles including a school resource teacher, a specialized program teacher for children with ADHD, a consultant role at the board level and a program teacher for children with learning disabilities. Her roles have included directly working with children and their families as well as collaborating and problem solving with educators. Within the Board her positions included a strong professional development component. She has been an active member in a number of organizations including Council for Exceptional Children, Learning Disabilities Association of Ontario, Children and Adults with Attention Deficit, Children's International Summer Villages, and Let's Talk Science. Tracy has been recognized as an outstanding educator through the OCSB Director's Commendation Award, the Council for Exceptional Children's Dorothy Mackay Educational Leadership Award, the University of Ottawa Community Service Learning Outstanding Achievement Award, and the Faculty of Education Part-time Professor Award.

Fanny Dagenais-Dion:

Fanny works with the Canadian Red Cross as International Humanitarian Law Coordinator for Easter Canada. She is a lawyer registered with the Quebec Bar, and a master's candidate in international law at the Université du Québec à Montréal (UQAM). Her research is focused on sexual violence committed in the context of conflict and the responsibility of commanders. She also is a research assistant at UQAM, mainly working on International Law and reconciliation. Before joining the CRC, Fanny was acting as legal advisor to victims of sexual violence, as well as in civil law. She also had the opportunity to work in Guatemala in a local human rights defense organization.

Ewan Geddes:

Ewan Geddes has been a Canadian and world studies teacher in the Toronto District School Board (TDSB) for the past 24 years. In addition to his classroom work, Geddes also served as his board's instructional leader of geography and spatial technology. He is a longstanding member and a past president of OAGEE, the Ontario Association for Geography and Environmental Education, through which he has facilitated G.I.S. workshops for the TDSB, the Faculty of Education at the University of Toronto, and at Ryerson University. He has co-authored several educational resources, including the most recent Grade 9 textbook for Ontario, and has served on various curriculum review and writing teams throughout the years. He embraces problem- and inquiry-based models of teaching and learning, as well as using technology as a learning tool to prepare students for life in the 21st century. Currently, he teaches at York Mills Collegiate Institute in Toronto, Ont.

Angela Hill:

Angela is a freelance reporter, photographer and communications consultant with a passion for storytelling. She has worked in newsrooms in Nunavut, Saskatchewan and Uganda, and reported from many countries including Mexico. South Africa and South Sudan.

As a Canadian Red Cross delegate, Angela has worked in Bangladesh in 2017 supporting the population movement operation, in Mozambique after Cyclone Idai, and in The Bahamas after Hurricane Dorian. Most recently she has worked in the Caribbean providing communications and community engagement support to 13 National Societies dealing with COVID-19 and several countries also dealing with dengue.

Andrea McArthur:

Andrea McArthur has worked with the Canadian Red Cross for many years as a public speaker, workshop facilitator, and program coordinator.
