Help people in Cuba now

Cuba is facing a deepening humanitarian crisis, driven by fuel shortages and disruptions to energy imports. Fuel shortages, power outages, and the lasting impacts of Hurricane Melissa have disrupted daily life and essential services across the country.

Access to clean water, sanitation, and hygiene is being impacted because 80 per cent of Cuba's water pumps run on electricity. Waste is piling up in the streets because garbage trucks can't drive. Food is going rotten as distribution and refrigeration come to a halt. Nursing homes, health centres, and schools go without power, leaving the most vulnerable groups at risk.

The situation is worsening by the hour—but you can help.

Our local partner, the Cuban Red Cross, continues to deliver humanitarian assistance throughout the country and remains a front-line responder, providing medical services, relief items, and psychosocial support.

The Canadian Red Cross has a long history of working with our partners in the Americas, including the Cuban Red Cross. Most recently, we provided humanitarian support in response to Hurricane Melissa.
